Given the outstanding landscapes and ecology of the Coromandel Peninsula and for the benefit of communities and future generations, we need much stronger planning regulations to protect our environment from Mining Activities. The PDP does not articulate the special Qualities, Values and Natural Character of the Coromandel Peninsula, therefore:

I oppose any part of the Proposed District Plan (PDP) which allows Mining Activities, including underground mining, in the District, especially in CONSERVATION, COASTAL, RURAL and RESIDENTIAL ZONES.

- I require the PDP to uphold biodiversity values expressed in the RMA Section 6. I require the Plan to Prohibit all Mining Activities in Outstanding Natural Landscape, Natural Character and Amenity Landscape Overlays in the Section 32 Rules.
- The Objectives and Policies in Section 14 do not reflect community and biodiversity values required by the Waikato Regional Policy Statement (RPS), the Resource Management Act (RMA) and Hauraki Gulf Marine Park Act (HGMPA).
- I require the Plan to specifically protect our coastal environment from mining. The Coastal Zone has been removed without giving adequate protection to coastal biodiversity from adverse impacts of mining. I require the Coastal Environment Overlay to include a rule prohibiting all mining activities.
- The TCDC has failed to translate the 'High Value Conservation Areas' identified in Schedule 4 into 'Outstanding Natural Landscapes' (ONL). I require the Plan to accurately protect Schedule 4 land on the Coromandel Peninsula from all Mining Activities by including all identified Schedule 4 land as part of the Outstanding Landscape Overlay.
- I am concerned that Newmont's Mining Activity in Waihi, including broken promises and mining expansion under people's homes without their consent, is a threat to our small coastal communities. I want the Plan to Prohibit Mining Activities under people's homes.
- I need to be confident that the TCDC has recognised the views of tangata whenua on mining in the PDP.

I oppose Section 37 - Mining Activities.

- Section 37.4 Note 1 fails to provide any rules for Underground Mining Activities in affected Zones outside the access zone.
- I want the TCDC to amend Section 37.4 Table 1 of the PDP to state that all Mining Activities are Prohibited in all Zones, including prospecting and exploration, or other such relief that has the same effect.
- I support Quarrying activities to be separated from Mining Activities to avoid confusion.

I oppose Section 14 - Mining Activities.

- I want the language of in Section 14.1 (Mining Activities) to clearly state how future mining activities will have a major adverse impact on the unique Conservation Values and Natural Character of the Coromandel. We must acknowledge the adverse impacts of the modern Mining Industry on small communities.
- I want the TCDC to remove the sentence: "The District has a long history of mining for gold and other minerals." (p73), and instead acknowledge that the Gold Mining boom lasted only 70 years, between 1860 and 1930, and was a small scale industry compared to the Mining Activities of today.
- I want the Plan to acknowledge the long term economic, social and environmental legacy of historical mining in the District and it's detrimental effects.
- Of particular concern to me is the statement "The Plan includes provisions to enable the Council to take the presence of mineral resources into account when assessing proposals for the subdivision, use and development of land." (p73) Along with Section 14.2.2 this gives mining priority over other forms of development. I oppose Mining Activities having such a priority. I completely disagree with the intention of 14.2.2 and require this to be removed as it is unrepresentative of community values.

Submission 725

- The Coromandel Peninsula Blueprint, where community values were assessed, has not been fully translated into the Parametria and development and biodiversity growth are not prioritised. I support the council to change the wording in the PDP to uphold these values expressed by Coromandel communities.
- There is no acknowledgment of the fact that a large number of Coromandel residents are opposed to mining, TCDC must acknowledge this, and that the 40 year history of the 'No Mining' campaign in Coromandel has contributed significantly to our Natural Character.

In summary: I require the plan to be amended so that all mining activities are prohibitied in all zones and overlays, or other such relief that has the same effect, and the language amended in Section 14 to accurately represent the history of mining and the opposition to it.

The special nature of the Coromandel warrants robust protection especially as there is so much economic revenue and employment dependent on our reputation as a clean green holiday destination. It is vital we do not allow mining into the Peninsula, as this is contrary to the existing Natural Character of the Thames-Coromandel District.

As someone who is moving to the Coromandel within the next two years to live I am appalled that the council could consider threatening the environment and values that we cherish about the Coromandel for an illusory pot od gold.



I am a dry stock farmer in the hill country behind Kopu. Farming on this and most hill country is not very financially rewarding so you have to look at other ways to boost your income to survive. My block grows our own organic vegetables and has a large orchard to help feed my family and keep costs down. My livelihood relies heavily on fire wood to make the whole dream of being a farm owner and living off the land viable. I am unable to sustain a fee to cut firewood and seek that Council delete the fee for farmers to cut and sell firewood. I oppose Section 29 - Biodiversity - rule 3.

This country has for more Tea Tree on it than it ever has had. It grows like weeds on this country and is regenerating back onto most hill country more than it has been harvested or cleared. The seed is in the ground so when you have cut it down the light gets in and more tea tree germinates from the dropped seed and it grows.

The Coromandel has thousands of hectares of native bush. Now Council wants me to not cut Tea tree on my own farming land so it can have more bush which will make the hill country worthless, I won't be able to run my stock and lose my farming job. Taking my job and meaning I might need to leave the area to look for work.

In a 5km radius of Kopu 6 different farmers that I know about sell tea tree on a small scale. By putting a tax on me to sell tea tree is going to make things very tough for me, my family and a lot of people who purchase tea tree. The cost will go up for people to purchase wood and people just won't be able to afford it.

I don't know anywhere on the Coromandel where large operations are cutting big areas of tea tree most are single one person operators. Look at the thousands of hectares of land that is in pine and is cleared on a massive scale, they take everything in their path destroying biodiversity, spray, replant and cut down again.

Why single out the little business cutting sustainability on a small scale, doing some honest work. My land in has a covenanted area and this is protected from stock, I only cut trees off our pasture fenced off land where tea tree regenerates.

I leave trees on steep areas and am selective to provide shade for animals on some of the flatter areas. Also my farm has planted a lot of natives but not just any old natives we have been very selective and planted rare natives from the Coromandel Rare tree list. These plantings are to encourage more birds and insects creating a better biodiversity to our land. Not to mention the work we do for pest removal such as opossums, rabbits, wild cats, hedgehogs, stoats, pigs and rodents that do a lot of damage to biodiversity. My family have joined the KiriKiri Bird Corridor group, this group consists of a dozen or so residents in the district that have come together to form a corridor. The group is active with predator traps which help to allow the recovery of some of the forest remnants long under threat. We have noticed a pleasing result with an increase in bird life with wood pigeons, hawks, resident tui and the newest edition of Kaka. The group plans to supplement the corridor through the transfer of some of the original tree species, several of which have long since gone from the Valley. My farm will continue to plant native trees on a yearly basis and support this group.

Spraying areas of tea tree like some farmers and forestry do kill not only the tea tree itself but the biodiversity that goes with it, on the trees, under the trees and around them. This is an unsustainable practice, it can cause slips, erosion, biodiversity loss and toxic residues in the ground and waterways. Slips from forestry occurred last year on the Kopu-Hikuai Road. If you must put a tax on, put it on these farmers and forestry.

I believe how I harvest tea tree is the best practice in a sustainable manner and putting other trees back into the environment.

In closing I thought Council were about economic growth and not compromising the future of small business?







THE HAURAKI PROSPECTORS ASSOC. INC.

The first meeting of the Association was held in September 1964 when 16 men with an interest in mining met at the claim of Mr. J Egan just south of the present battery site. The aims were to erect a gold treatment plant in Thames and to encourage prospecting for all ages.

In 1965 after lengthy negotiations, the 'New Alaska' 10 head stamper battery at Neavesville (inland from Puriri) was purchased by the Association for the sum of £5. The task of dismantling and transporting the battery to Thames was a mammoth one as it was over half a mile from the nearest logging road and many of the parts were extremely heavy, each stamp alone weighing 800lb. without the dedicated effort of members and in particular the first president Mr. H Watson and Secretary Me. G.W Wild together with financial assistance from the Mines Department and local people, the battery would probably still be at Neavesville.

By April 1967 all the heavy machinery had been transported to Thames and after some delays in obtaining a suitable site the present building was commenced early in 1968. Since its completion members have been fully occupied in re-assembling the equipment. This has been a long and sometimes disheartening job and many modifications and additions have been necessary. Steel has replaced the original pit sawn kauri for structural support and a ball mill has been added to make the process more efficient. By the end of 1972 all the machinery was in running order but a full scale test has yet to be held.

An adjoining mine tunnel, probably part of the old Golden Crown claim has been re-opened for visitors most of this work being done by Messrs A. Bateman and W. Jones.

The Association is now an incorporated society and meets regularly at 7:45p.m on the second Monday of each Month at the old School of Mines building in Cochrane Street and on most weekends members are engaged in working parties at the battery. Visitors are welcomed and their financial support purchase of specimens, souvenir certificate or by donations is much appreciated.





The tour underground can be muddy, especially during the wetter months. Bring closed-toe footwear and a water proof jacket just in case, your own torch if you have one, and plenty of luck to strike it rich!

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ABOUT THE HPA - A BRIEF HISTORY:

The Hauraki Prospectors Association Incorporated (HPA,) was formed 30 years ago by a couple of retired gold miners. Sawyer's Stamper Battery had just closed it doors, the gold mining companies had disbanded and the town of Thames was focussed on other means of making a living. And yet, the prospectors held a firm belief that gold was still to be found. ("gold fever" was still running high). The only problem to overcome was to how to process their gold-bearing ore.







The solution; to build a Stamper Battery. A site was chosen. What better place than one of the richest hard rock gold fields in New Zealand, the site of the world famous Caledonian -Golden Crown - Manukau claim situated in Thames.

And so, the quest of the HPA began: to recover old gold mining equipment, fix it, install it, and obtain gold. When the HPA first moved into their claim, only the single-head Sawyer Battery still stood, next to a tabby cat - later to be named "Battery Cat". (Battery Cat is currently the "Resident Rodent Control Officer" for the HPA)







from Neasville on the Hauraki Plains. Berdans, Jaw crushers and miscellaneous parts came from various other sources, such as Judds Foundry, A&G Price, Individual donations, and out of the bush. A Boiler house was built, the refurbished steam Engine and wood-fired boiler installed. A number of historic buildings were rescued from ruin, including the old morgue, and Judd Office.






To build new structures - building materials were needed. With no budget for the year - the HPA volunteered to do demolition jobs around town, Thames High School and Judds Foundry to name a few.

Old tunnels were reopened and the search for gold began. (Incidentally, there is an estimated 2 billion dollars worth of gold, unclaimed within the region today!)

Many people began to visit the HPA - curious to see what all the noise was about (literally, you'll hear what I mean if you visit Goldmine Experience). It seemed to the HPA, that a lot of people had gold fever too, and a general interest in the past. Official tours of the HPA operation began. The HPA annual budget now covered beer, tea, milk, and Battery Cat food costs.





Today the HPA are constructing a new Stamper battery that will be twice the size of the current one! This is in order to process a greater volume of gold ore. New tunnels have been reopened and gold discovered. The ore is quite rich at 1 oz/ton. Also, the HPA are digging their way down to the 100 - 200 foot below-sea level. The Golden Crown Mine Shaft is being reopened, and a head frame is being built with a grant from the Lotteries Commission Board.


There are currently about 50 members of the HPA, and a core group of about 10. The HPA volunteer group is made up of Lawyers, Engineers, Designers, Builders, Electricians, Parliamentary journalists... Working "Bs" are held at the claim, on the second Saturday of every month. Members also go on field trips to gold mining related sites, when there is the inclination.
