I oppose any part of the Proposed District Plan (PDP) which allows Mining Activities, including underground mining, in the District, especially in CONSERVATION, COASTAL, RURAL and RESIDENTIAL ZONES.

- I require the PDP to uphold biodiversity values expressed in the RMA Section 6. I require the Plan to <u>Prohibit</u> <u>all Mining Activities in Outstanding Natural Landscape</u>, <u>Natural Character and Amenity Landscape</u> <u>Overlays</u> in the Section 32 Rules.
- The Objectives and Policies in Section 14 do not reflect community and biodiversity values required by the Waikato Regional Policy Statement (RPS), the Resource Management Act (RMA) and Hauraki Gulf Marine Park Act (HGMPA).
- I require the Plan to specifically protect our coastal environment from mining. The Coastal Zone has been
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 the Coastal Environment Overlay to include a rule prohibiting all mining activities.
- The TCDC has failed to translate the 'High Value Conservation Areas' identified in Schedule 4 into
 'Outstanding Natural Landscapes' (ONL). I require the Plan to accurately protect Schedule 4 land on the
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 Conservation Zone and classifying mining activities as prohibited activities.
- I am concerned that Newmont's Mining Activity in Waihi, including broken promises and mining expansion
 under people's homes without their consent, is a threat to our small coastal communities. I want the Plan to
 Prohibit Mining Activities under people's homes.
- I need to be confident that the TCDC has recognised the views of tangata whenua on mining in the PDP.

- Section 37.4 Note 1 fails to provide any rules for Underground Mining Activities in affected Zones outside the
 access zone.
- I want the TCDC to amend Section 37.4 Table 1 of the PDP to state that all <u>Mining Activities are Prohibited</u> in all Zones, including prospecting and exploration, or other such relief that has the same effect.
- I support Quarrying activities to be separated from Mining Activities to avoid confusion.

- I want the language of in Section 14.1 (Mining Activities) to clearly state how future mining activities will have a major adverse impact on the unique Conservation Values and Natural Character of the Coromandel. We must acknowledge the adverse impacts of the modern Mining Industry on small communities.

3 EHS and the Needs of EHS sufferers

"Human beings (and other living creatures) rely on electrochemical communication in the body for survival. Messages within and between cells determine the health and well-being of the individual, including accurate cellular replication. These messages consist of amazingly complex instructions involving the interchange of electrical impulses and chemical changes. This process begins at conception and only ceases at death".²

"All living cells, and indeed whole living beings, no matter what genus or species, are dynamic coherent electrical systems utterly reliant on bioelectricity for life's most basic metabolic processes. It turns out that most living things are fantastically sensitive to vanishingly small EMF exposures. Living cells interpret such exposures as part of our normal cellular activities (think heartbeats, brainwaves, cell division itself, etc.) The problem is, man-made electromagnetic exposures aren't "normal." They are artificial artifacts, with unusual intensities, signalling characteristics, pulsing patterns, and wave forms, that don't exist in nature. And they can misdirect cells in myriad ways." ³

The high levels of electromagnetic radiation (EMR) in our environment today are caused by pulsed modulated microwave radiation emitted from technologies that include 'smart' phones, cell phones, cell towers, baby minders, cordless phones, wi-fi, 'smart' meters, and wireless weather stations, as well as electromagnetic radiation emitted from power lines, all electrical appliances, motor vehicles, and digital television transmissions. Our present exposure to man-made microwaves is over a billion times greater than the typical natural background levels.

Many of the biological effects of electromagnetic fields can be accounted for by the *electrical effects on living cells* – in particular on the cell membranes. Removal of structurally important calcium ions from cell membranes - and subsequent leakage of those membranes - accounts for several of the known effects of EMR exposure, including heart arrhythmia, skin rashes, and fatigue. Other known detrimental effects of EMR exposure include DNA damage, disruption of tissue structures such as the blood-brain barrier, impacts on vessel and immune functions, and loss of fertility.

Electro-hypersensitivity (EHS) is an environmentally induced disability, defined by the World Health Organisation as

"A phenomenon where individuals experience adverse health effects when using or in the vicinity of devices emanating electric, magnetic, or electromagnetic fields."

Symptoms of EHS can be debilitating and life-threatening. These include extreme fatigue, sleep disturbances, prickling skin, dizziness, intense burning sensations and rashes, confusion, memory loss, excruciating and piercing headaches, breathlessness, pain and aches in muscles, racing pulse, heart arrhythmia, burning sensations in the chest, lacerating internal pain, and heart attacks. These have been well documented in scientific literature (see the BioIniative Report).

Among the earliest diagnosed cases of EHS were people exposed to the radiation in the Ericsson cell-phone research and development facilities in Sweden. In response, the Swedish government provided worker compensation support to those whose health was impaired, including providing special paint or shielding foil for their homes. A Working for Life Fund created in 1991 by then Swedish Minister of Labour Anna-Greta Leijon provided 8.9million Swedish Crowns for these measures, after around 60 engineers at the company developed EHS.

Some EHS sufferers may experience immediate and piercing pain upon exposure to artificial EMR, whereas for others it may take some hours, days or even weeks for them to become sensitised to the radiation. Once sensitised, reaction times when exposed to that particular frequency can be shorter, and the symptoms more severe. The dose that can trigger adverse effects in people with EHS can be very low. A neighbour's wi-fi, a nearby cell phone tower, a 'smart' meter on a neighbouring property, fluorescent lights, radiation from a nearby cell phone, or even a battery powered clock can be enough to initiate intense suffering.

Increasingly, those with EHS over time can also become sensitive to many common household cleaners and other chemicals. This can cause painful inflammation of the eyes and skin. Others get allergic reactions from prescription medicines or local anaesthetic. Professor Olle Johansson has established that there is a connection between EHS and multiple chemical sensitivity (MCS).

Identifying those who are EHS

Electro-hypersensitivity (EHS) is estimated to currently affect 3% of the population of developed nations, with sensitivity varying from mild to severe. Independent research has predicted a significant increase in the number of EHS sufferers due to the increase in electro-pollution levels in our environment.

The Austrian Medical Association has produced a consensus document acknowledging EHS, and has formulated protocols for its diagnosis.

Also, a new technique - Pulsed Eco-Doppler of the brain⁶ shows that people with EHS have a reduced perfusion of the brain, and particularly the left part of the limbic area of the brain, compared to the control group. The results of these objective tests have forced the diagnosis of EHS, also known as "Electromagnetic Fields Intolerance" as a physical illness based on objective tests by those who formerly claimed it was a psychosomatic condition. ⁷



I **oppose** the various provisions for Visitor Accommodation throughout the Proposed Thames Coromandel District Plan ("Proposed Plan") as they relate to renting out of private dwellings/holiday homes.

There is no proven evidence that the consumption of local resources and the amenity effects on neighbours are any different with holiday rental holiday homes compared to properties used by their owner/family/friends.

The proposed changes will affect existing holiday home owners, as well as those that aspire to holiday home ownership in the Coromandel. In particular I believe the rules:

- Will decrease the income I receive from my holiday home income I use to offset expenses such as rates and maintenance.
- Could reduce the value of my property as holiday home ownership becomes less desirable in the Coromandel due to the limitations imposed on holiday rental.
- Will mean less choice for tourists wishing to stay in the Coromandel, resulting in fewer visitors to the region, impacting on Coromandel businesses as result.
- · Will not change the amenity effects arising from holiday home usage on the Coromandel

I seek the following decision from the Thames Coromandel District Council:

As Principal Relief

(i) Amend the definition of "Visitor Accommodation" in the Proposed Plan, such that the rental of holiday homes is specifically excluded from the definition.

Or, in the alternative, if the principal relief in (i) above is not accepted

(ii) Amend all references to the permitted activity conditions for *Visitor Accommodation* in the various zones throughout the Proposed Plan relating to "6 tariff-paid customers on-site at any one time" instead amending this to "12 tariff-paid customers on-site at any one time", and delete any condition requiring the activity to be undertaken within an existing dwelling, minor unit or accessory building.

- I require the PDP to uphold biodiversity values expressed in the RMA Section 6. I require the Plan to Prohibit all Mining Activities in Outstanding Natural Landscape, Natural Character and Amenity Landscape Overlays in the Section 32 Rules.
